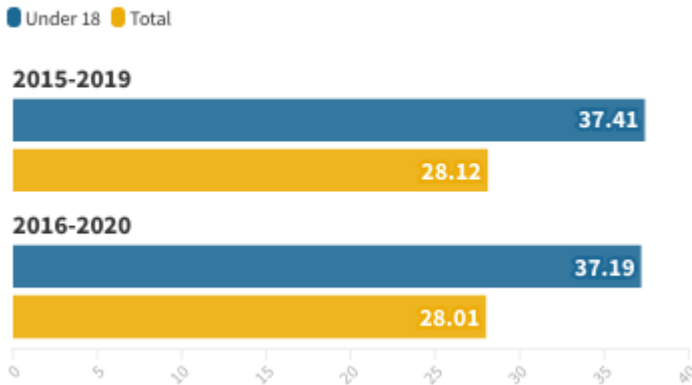


Hartford Youth Profile

Hartford Poverty Status

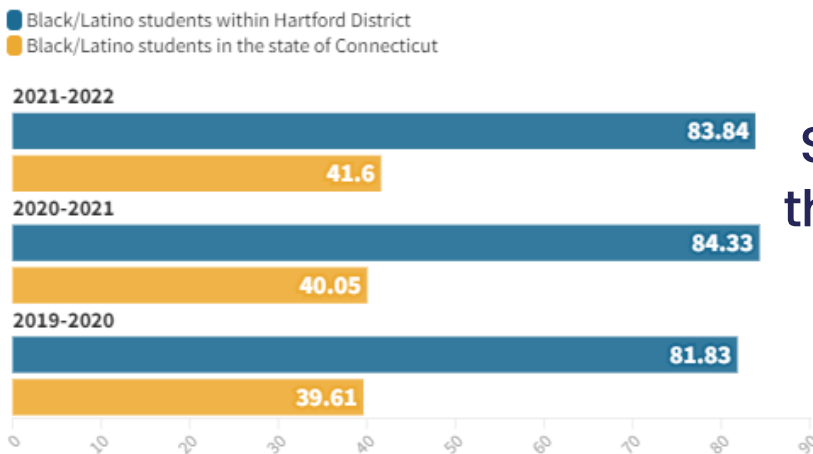


In 2016–2020, 37.19% of Hartford youth under the age 18 were below poverty level.

Hartford Race/Ethnicity

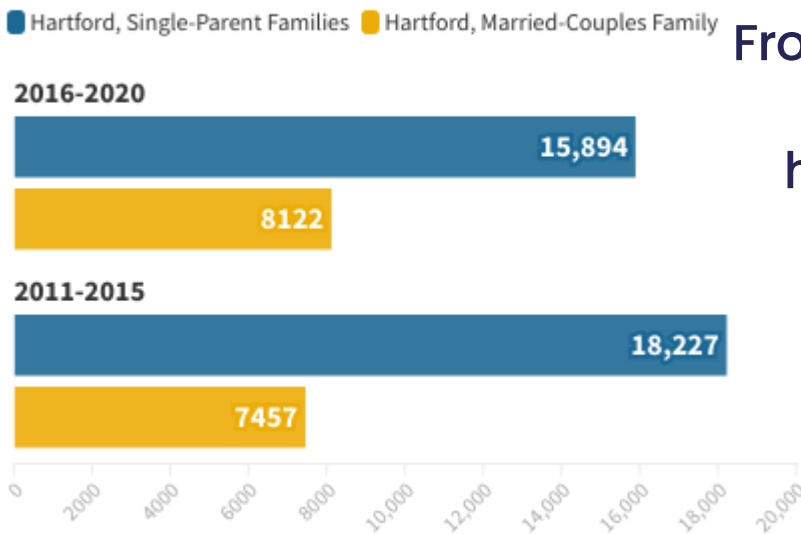


Currently, Black/Latino Students make up 83% of the Hartford School District Students.

Hartford Single-Parent Households



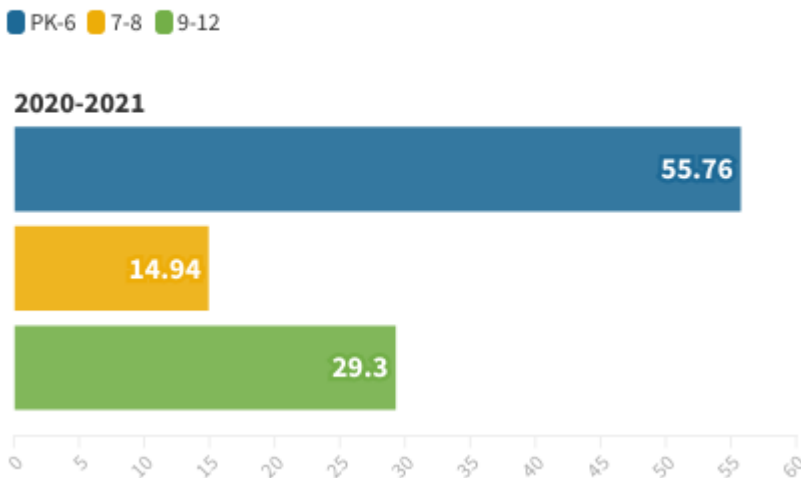
From 2011–2020, more than fifteen thousand households in Hartford were single-parent families.

Hartford District Enrollment By Grade Range



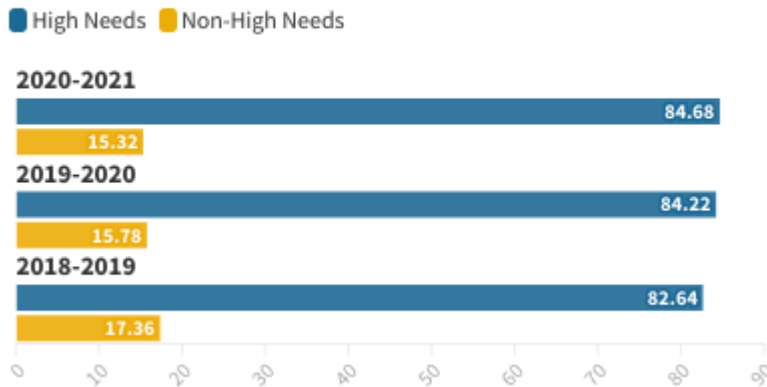

Throughout the past 3 years, Hartford District Students consisted of at least 80% or more High Need Students.

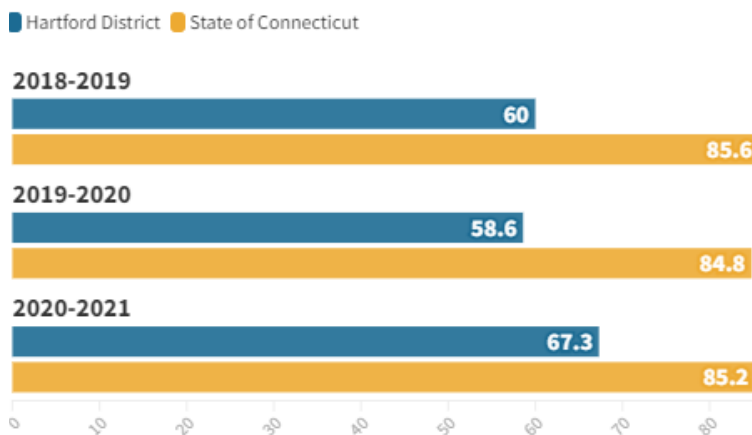

High Needs students are characterized by students with a disability, English Learners, or eligible for free or reduced-price meals.



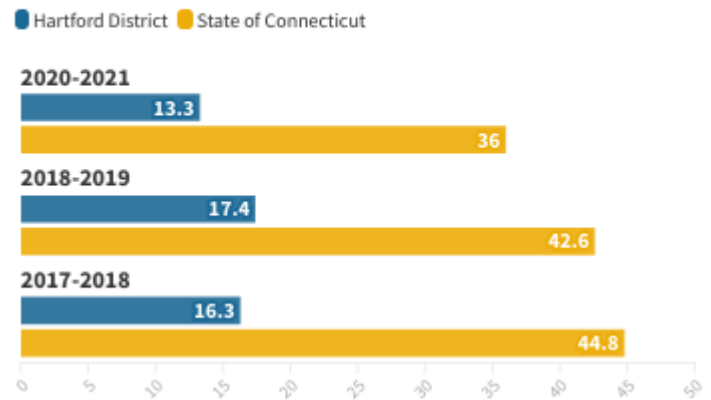
College Readiness
