


Youth have an imperative role in Connecticut's capital, Hartford.

These data sets capture Hartford Youth's identity, family structure, and education, and are current as of August 2022.






In 2016-2020, 37.19% of Hartford youth under the age 18 were below poverty level.

Students.



## **Hartford Youth Profile**




#### **Hartford Single-Parent Households**



### Hartford High Needs Students




Throughout the past 3 years, Hartford District Students consisted of at least 80% or more High Need Students.

# **College Readiness**



In 2020-2021 60% of graduating Hartford seniors were enrolled in College and Career Readiness courses and 13.3% students met the benchmark on the college readiness exam.
